


## DOSBARTH MISS LLOYD ACTIVITIES

### **English:**

Read the information about elephants and answer the questions. Don't forget to answer in full sentences, using capital letters and full stops.

Found throughout many countries in eastern and southern Africa, the amazing African Elephant is the largest land animal and is even larger than the Indian Elephant! If you're travelling in countries such as Botswana, Tanzania or Zimbabwe, you might be lucky enough to sport one.

What do elephants look like?

African Elephants are about 3 meters tall and they weigh about 5,400 kilograms. Male elephants are bigger than females, but they both have tusks. Sadly, some people kill these beautiful creatures for their tusks because they can be sold for a lot of money. Elephants have grey-brown skin, which has very little hair. African Elephants' ears can be up to 1.5 metres long and can be used to cool them down so they don't become overheated!

What do elephants eat?

These herbivores actually spend most of their time eating. They eat roots, grasses, leaves, fruit and bark and can eat up to 260 kilograms every day when they become adults! They use their tusks and trunk to get food and water. To get water, the elephant sucks it into their trunk, then curls it towards their mouth and squirts the water into it. Elephants breathe through two nostrils at the end of their trunk, which is an extension of their nose.

How do elephants behave?

Elephants are very loyal animals and they like living in herds. Their family groups are headed by a female, who is called a cow. Sometimes, males, who are called bulls, will join the group, but the females are still in charge.

If we want elephants to remain on Earth, we need to protect them. The elephant's main enemy is man. Farmers destroy their homes and poachers kill them for their tusks.
